This fragile ecosystem is home to myriad species including moose, bear, and migratory songbirds, along with several endangered and threatened species, including Canada lynx, and Atlantic salmon, among others.

Since 2007 the award-winning photography team of Thomas Mark Szelog and Lee Ann Szelog have logged over 25,000 miles putting a face to the land that is the proposed 3.2 million acre Maine Woods National Park. Through their *Maine Woods National Park Photo-Documentation Project* they provide inspiration, education, and motivation, through photographs and words, to encourage society, nationwide, to work together in the spirit of cooperation to create the Maine Woods National Park for the benefit of nature, wildlife, our planet and all mankind. They will personally guide you into the proposed park in this presentation and allow you to experience this astounding ecosystem, and learn more about the proposed Maine Woods National Park and the benefits it will impart. You will be inspired to embrace sustainability through foresight and discipline and take responsibility to make the necessary changes to ensure all species, human and wild, continue to have earth to call home. This presentation and the *Project* embody the heart of sustainability, vision and leadership, awakening peoples’ environmental conscience to think and act with determination for our benefit and that of our earth and America, the beautiful.
